LIVING AMPHIBIOUSLY

As we turn the page to 2022, it has become clear that life has changed irreversibly. With the sudden emergence of the Omicron variant, we are forced to accept the reality that Covid is not going away any time soon.



So now the question that seems to be predominate is no longer how to get beyond Covid, but how do we live with it?

The first Shabbat in January will introduce us to part of the solution. In the Torah we'll begin to recount the Ten Plagues, and in particular the second one, the plague of frogs. We need to be like the Israelites in Egypt, who had to bear the impact of this affliction. The Torah tells us that some of the Ten Plagues bypassed ("passed over") the Israelites, but not the first three. The bloody Nile was no less bloody for our ancestors (Ex. 7:21) than for their Egyptian neighbors. The frogs were no less froggy, covering the "whole land of Egypt" (8:2). Same holds for vermin (8:13). The text states explicitly that the vermin affected "all of Egypt."

Only when the fourth plague is announced does the pattern shift so that the Israelites are spared: "And in that day I will set apart the land of Goshen, in which My people dwell, that no swarms of flies shall be there, in order that you may know that I am the Lord in the midst of the land." (Ex 8: 22). Thank God, no flies. The Israelites were spared, most famously, from the final plague, the death of the first born.

But for blood, frogs and vermin, the Israelites had to endure and adapt, just as we have to adapt to the current plague. It spares no one.

So how does one adapt to a plague. Here's a hint: Ribit. Ribit.

According to an authoritative source – a children's song – One morning when Pharaoh woke in his bed there were frogs in his bed and frogs on his head. We feel the same way.

Covid here, Covid there, Covid jumping everywhere!

We have to learn how to live amphibiously. We need to get used to a hybrid existence, maintaining our social networks, because if we have learned one thing over the past two years, it's that we need social connections; and if we've learned something else, it's that it is possible to stay connected even when physical proximity isn't feasible.

How do we deal with this? Neither by burying our heads in the sand nor our bodies in the basement. We need to learn how to thrive both in-person and online, and to be able to shift between the two effortlessly. We need to become permanently amphibious. Hybrid is the word of the year for 2022, describing our cars, our food, our workplaces, and our social and religious gatherings too.

Right now, all our services and most educational events are available online. We've done many social gatherings and some religious services in person as well, and we can shift *Continued on page 16...*

As a congregation we worked together to accomplish what was needed to provide for those less fortunate in our community

We stayed safe and did not contribute to the spread of COVID in our community

Bad news:

• Santa and Mrs. Claus could not hand out the gifts

We did not get to hear our three magnificent choirs sing • holiday songs and raise the spirits of the residents (usually led by Caryl Poser, Sue Schneiderman and Leslie Heyison/ Jodi Maxner)

• We missed Rabbi Hammerman and Mara saying words of wisdom to the residents at the shelters

We did not get to be in person and work side by side with our fellow congregants

We did not get to share a meal at Ocha after our work ٠ was done at the shelters

Although we were all disappointed in the modified events, we should focus mostly on why we do this event.

It is to provide for people in our community that need a hand during difficult times. It is to perform tzedakah. It is to remind ourselves what is important in life and to make sure we keep perspective on things which is not always easy to do in Fairfield County.

So, the main objectives we have accomplished!

We hope that 2022 brings an end to the pandemic (maybe we'll be in an endemic phase) so that we can come together in person to do tzedakah.

This event would not be possible if not for the efforts of my co-chairs Karen Resnick and Joy Katz. Year after year they are the site leaders for New Covenant and Pacific House respectively. They are a sounding board and generate ideas with me on how to organize the event. They collect the items and deliver them to the site. This year Karen, Bill, Molly and Rachel also worked side by side with Belle Horwitz and Jon Weiner to package the "to go" lunch boxes at New Covenant, make the hot chocolate and hand out the gifts. At Pacific House and Franklin Street, we did not have people at the site due to COVID protocols at the shelters.



without moving to hide it or fade it or fix it.

I want to know if you can be with joy mine or your own if you can dance with wildness and let the ecstasy fill you to the tips of your fingers and toes without cautioning us to be careful to be realistic to remember the limitations of being human.

It doesn't interest me if the story you are telling me is true. I want to know if you can disappoint another to be true to yourself. If you can bear the accusation of betrayal and not betray your own soul. If you can be faithless and therefore trustworthy.

I want to know if you can see Beauty even when it is not pretty every day. And if you can source your own life from its presence.

I want to know if you can live with failure yours and mine and still stand at the edge of the lake and shout to the silver of the full moon, "Yes."

It doesn't interest me to know where you live or how much money you have. I want to know if you can get up after the night of grief and despair weary and bruised to the bone and do what needs to be done to feed the children.

It doesn't interest me who you know or how you came to be here. I want to know if you will stand in the centre of the fire with me and not shrink back.

It doesn't interest me where or what or with whom

you have studied. I want to know what sustains you from the inside when all else falls away.

I want to know if you can be alone with yourself and if you truly like the company you keep in the empty moments.

on a dime between the sanctuary and Zoom. The hybrid option gives us an additional advantage – we never have to cancel due to weather! So, it's important for you to check our email announcements for last minute changes and links. But you're used to adapting on the fly by now, right?

As we continue to adjust our sails to the shifting winds of Covid, we are reminded that the most important thing is to stay safe, which means vaccination, boosters, masks and distancing. But for a healthy religious institution like ours, it also means striving for excellence on this hybrid playing field, so that congregants can be inspired and connected to their community no matter how they choose to engage, whether in person or online. That's been our goal for nearly two years now. What's new for 2022 is that now we understand that this will be our challenge for a long time to come.

Yes, the book of Exodus will have a special meaning for us this year. Life is complicated these days, but to paraphrase a famous frog, it was never easy being green. If we learn to live amphibiously, it comes with the reluctant admission that there will always be frogs here, frogs there, frogs everywhere. But we can do this. We're the folks who turned a plague into a children's song. Now we simply have to turn it into an opportunity to reach people and engage them, wherever they are.

And for everyone, my best wishes for a better 2022. Better times are coming. But don't merely be optimistic. Be hopeful. As Rabbi Jonathan Sacks said, "Optimism is the belief that things are going to get better. Hope is the belief that we can make things better. Optimism is a passive virtue, hope is an active one. It takes no courage to be an optimist, but it does need courage to hope."

A happy – and hopeful – New Year!

On a personal note, my thanks to Jami Fener, who informed us that she will be moving on to other professional opportunities and leaving our staff, where she has played many roles. Jami and her family have been such



an important part of TBE since their arrival (when she was 12) and thankfully that will not change. THANK YOU FOR EVERYTHING, JAMI!

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




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
