ON ONE FOOT

On Two Feet

My bulletin column, as you know, has long been called "On One Foot." The concept was first introduced by the sage Hillel, who proved that the entire essence of the Torah can be proclaimed while



standing "On One Foot," i.e., with great clarity and simplicity. He then went on to say, "What is hateful to you do not do unto others," the Golden Rule, to which he added, "The rest is commentary, now go and study."

It's time to begin focusing on the second part of Hillel's famous maxim. Yes, things can be simplified, and yes, it is important to communicate goals with great clarity. But that is no substitute for the hard work of establishing foundational goals and doggedly pursuing them, and one of those prime goals should be to make Jewish learning a lifelong passion. In other words, there are some tasks that require us to roll up our sleeves and stand firmly on BOTH feet, something we need to do before springing forward.

The wonderful website MyJewishLearning.com recently released an interesting list: "120 Jewish Books for Every Age." They list an appropriate book for a person at every age from 0 to 120. The list includes all-time classics and current best sellers, and I'm proud to say I've read the vast majority of them, though not necessarily at the recommended ages. I've included the full list in this bulletin so that you can get started over the summer. If you go to the website, https://www.myjewishlearning.com/120-jewish- books-for-every-age/, you'll find why each book was selected, including why Dr. Ruth's Guide to Good Sex was picked for 74-year-olds and Man's Search for Meaning at 101. You've got to figure that both books might have been a tad more useful if introduced earlier. Judy Blume's Are You -There God? It's Me, Margaret is the pick for 11-year-olds, which is noteworthy in that it's coming out as a movie later this year, and her book Forever has popped up in some banned book lists in Florida. Maus, recently banned in Tennessee, is on this list too (for age 34).

We, the People of the Book, do not ban books.

While I might quibble about a few of the selections, for the most part, you can't go wrong by reading them – and if you read them all, you will definitely be the most Jewishly literate person on your block, if not the world – and if you teach them in Florida, best to get a lawyer.

The Chief Rabbi of England, Jonathan Sacks z'l, once spoke before a group of clergy here. His words were most eloquent. At the beginning of the speech, he spoke of the lesson he learned from the G.P.S. he recently had installed in his car: "So long as you know your destination, no matter how lost you get, there is always a route from here to there."

As we go from standing on one foot to jumping in with both feet, let's keep our eyes fully focused on that ultimate destination: To be a joyous and Jewishly literate, filled with warmth, the love of Israel, the pursuit of justice everywhere and bursting with inspiration from the timeless ideas of our hyd people.

The Road Trip Home

Have you ever had a deeply spiritual experience on a road trip? You get into the car, enter a destination into your GPS, cue up the playlist, open the podcasts, and set out for an adventure. The road before you is wide open. You have a full tank of gas and many miles to



go before you will stop the car. Sometimes, that's all there is, just a journey and a destination. Other times, the car can become a transformational time warping machine.

It was June 8, 2022 and I was headed out on a solo road trip to visit my sister in Pittsburgh, PA. I had never driven a full seven-hour trip by myself, so I was a bit anxious but also really looking forward to having the time alone in my car to think and just be. My sister had a baby during the pandemic and I was eager to see them and spend some time recharging with her. I set out on my way to see her, on a beautiful day, and began the drive that I knew would take all day. I listened to two of my favorite podcasts, OnBeing and Judaism Unbound, caught up on an Astrology teaching, and, before I knew it, I had driven for four hours. I wasn't tired, instead I was inspired, joyful, light, and grateful for the time alone. I pulled over to stop and grab a bite to eat and put more gas in the car.

As I was about to head back on I-80 WEST I received a phone call from my husband telling me that he wasn't feeling well and he had just tested positive for COVID, again. I was facing a dilemma, but not really. After speaking to my sister and checking in with my gut, I knew I had no other choice but to head back to Connecticut to take care of my family, and also avoid exposing my sister's family. Shortly after hearing from my husband, I reached a peak experience of clarity and understanding, acceptance, and divine grace. I wasn't supposed to go to Pittsburgh. It just wasn't meant to be. I was, however, supposed to drive four hours away from my home to the center of Pennsylvania, stop, and turn back around and drive four more hours back home.

Certain of a deeper meaning and purpose in the sequence of events, I zoomed out and took an even wider view. I felt an unquestionable feeling that I can only name as beshert, or, meant to be. I couldn't explain it at the time, but somehow this fakakta journey was exactly as it needed to be. I had to chuckle as I pulled my car out of the gas station and turned to get back onto I-80 but this time going EAST. Woah, something very meta was happening and I could feel it, but I wasn't exactly sure what it was trying to say.

My mind started racing to make meaning from the experience. Maybe this was just a way for me to see that I was capable of a long drive (now, actually 9 hours in one day)? Maybe I was avoiding something by not making it to Pittsburgh? Perhaps this was a gift of some sweet time with my children with whom I haven't had enough time lately? I knew that I was seeking space, rest, and a change of scenery, but the trip sent me right back home with the deep yet also

Reaching Out to the Community

One of the many things I do is reaching out to the broad Jewish community each week by visiting the area's senior residences on Friday afternoons. While there, I bring the joy of



Kabbalat Shabbat, some songs and readings from a traditional service prior to the start of Shabbat.

The number of residents at services varies each time I am there. I visit assisted living facilities on varying schedules, some monthly and others twice-a-month. The service is a bit different at each one, too, as each facility is a different "congregation" with different needs.

At some residences I go completely through a service as my friends want to hear the familiar sounds, some singing along. Other residences have services with more English readings. I strive at all times to get everyone involved in the service, from responsive readings to singing. I always encourage them to ask questions or comment on various parts of the service.

We pray and sing, and talk of Jewish news and events, and I share a short commentary on the week's Torah portion or an explanation of an upcoming holiday. We recently talked about the end of the Book of Leviticus and the start of the Book of Numbers. And I discussed the holiday of Shavuot with them, it's meaning and ways we celebrate.

At the end of each visit, we enjoy wine and challah, bringing those familiar tastes to the residents, connecting them to their religion. For some, this is their only regular Jewish experience. Others are still active in area congregations or celebrate events with local family and friends.

My visits are important for another reason...to show that Temple Beth El reaches out and cares for the entire Jewish community.



The Frank Sinatra You Might Not Have Known





Frank's mother often left her son in the care of a Jewish neighbor, Mrs. Golden, who could talk to the child only in Yiddish. And among dozens of prestigious awards, one of the most precious gifts that Sinatra had was a small mezuzah presented by the same neighbor, Mrs. Golden. As he became rich, he thanked his Jewish nanny, Mrs. Golden, by buying her a quarter of a million dollars of Israeli bonds.

In 1942, when information about Nazi crimes against Jews finally came to America, Sinatra bought hundreds of medals commissioned with the image of Saint Christopher on one side and the Star of David on the other. He handed out these medals at his concerts.

In 1943 he joined the national tour, "We will Never Die," a four-month dramatized performance in six cities, hosted by Ben Hecht, to draw public attention to the Holocaust.

In 1944 Sinatra insisted that his Jewish friend, Mani Sachs, would be a godfather at the baptism of his son, despite loud protests by a Catholic priest.

In the late 1940s he left the golf club which did not accept Jews and defiantly became a member of another golf club - the Jewish one.

One day Sinatra overheard a reporter call someone a "Jewish bastard" at a party. Sinatra immediately knocked him down with a hook in a jaw.

There's a 1945 short film, "The House I Live In," where Sinatra sings a song with the following words: "Children of all races and religions in the playground are America for me." According to the script, Frank's hero witnesses the beating of a Jewish boy. The hero turns to the bullies: "Remember, suckers and religious differences have no meaning, except for Nazis and fools like you."

Commenting on the film, Sinatra stated that children themselves are not to blame for racial and religious intolerance: "Children hear their parents talk about McGinty or Ginsburg and think there must be a Catholic or a Jew."

In 1947 Frank Sinatra participated in a benefit concert in support of the Zionist Movement. He spoke at a Hollywood Bowl action rally that drew 20,000 supporters.

In 1948 he even helped in the illegal delivery of weapons to Israel. The representative of Hagana in the United States was then the future Mayor of Jerusalem, Teddy Kolek, who bought a shipment of heavy weapons and asked the "singer" for assistance. Sinatra was to handover a bag full of cash to the captain of a ship on a wharf in New York. It was the only way to confuse the several agents who had long grazed Kollek. The operation was successful. The ship departed and arrived safely at its destination.


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RELIGIOUS SCHOOL ANNOUNCEMENT

REMARKS FROM TBE ANNUAL MEETING - MAY 25, 2022

LISA MANHEIM, TBE PRESIDENT

I wrote these remarks before the horrific event in Texas yesterday, but it actually amplifies the need for what I'd like to discuss, which is human connection.

Last night was the series finale of *This is Us.* Millions of people across the country have spent the last six years getting to know the extended Pearson family in a series that was known to evoke tears in even the thickest-skinned among us. I did not actually see the episode yet–I'm still on season 4, so no spoilers. But I love it–it's a show that celebrates family and human connection. The characters on this show have endured it all: depression, anxiety, addiction, fertility issues, disability. In the end, the thing that always saves them is their connection to each other and to their communities. After all, the show is called "this is us" not "this is me."

The show weaves flashbacks and flash-forwards through current time, showing the inextricable connection between past, present and future; a real "l'dor v'dor" tenor underscores the entire series as we see how the decisions that characters make in their youth affect them, their children, and grandchildren in the future. The show makes me think about the importance of connection and how people truly gravitate towards it, need it, and desire it. E.M Forrester said it most famously: "Only connect... and human love will be seen at its height."

Judaism promotes this type of human connection in countless ways: we require 10 people to make a minyan, we encourage people to attend shivas to be there for grieving families, we invite our friends to share in our joy of B'nai Mitzvah and weddings and baby namings.

And it's been something top of mind in every conversation, meeting or event we've had over the past two years, as the clergy, the professional staff, and the leadership attempted to navigate a time that severely challenged our ability to connect as we were relegated—for a long time—to our separate homes.

Every volunteer that is being honored tonight, every current and outgoing Board member, every Past President, Rabbi Hammerman and Cantor Kaplan have all put forth a colossal effort to safeguard this sacred connection, be it through a Zoom minyan, planning a festive Temple Rock, overseeing renovation projects that make TBE a more inviting place, socializing with congregants over bagels on a Sunday, holding a clothing drive to help those in need, or connecting with kids in a religious school classroom. And speaking of classrooms, I am excited to announce tonight that, upon approval of the Board of Trustees in June, we plan to partner with Congregation Beth El Norwalk's religious school, which will be headed up by our own Lisa Gittelman-Udi. The kids who attend our Religious School will be able expand their own connections into the wider Jewish community. Only connect-not through a smartphone or a Nintendo Switch or even a computer screen, but in a classroom alongside a group of other kids.

It is in this vein that I encourage our congregants to

embrace this effort, to come back–in person as often as possible– to your spiritual home. Zoom is a wonderful substitute for those times when you cannot be somewhere in person, but it is not the same. You can watch or even participate in a service on Zoom, but you'll miss the funny story a friend tells you over a piece of cake at the Kiddush. You can Zoom into a minyan, but you won't get to hug your grieving friend who came to say Kaddish. You can have a meeting on Zoom, but synergy suffers when you can't read someone's face or piggyback on a comment without a lag. We are social creatures, meant to grow and evolve in the company of others and as a result of our relationships.

Only connect... and human love will be seen at its height. Come back to services on Friday nights and Saturday mornings and connect with the Rabbi, the Cantor, and your fellow congregants over centuries - old psalms and prayers. Come out to our Thursday night social club events, whether we are eating sushi in a sukkah, drinking home brew from a keg, or singing around a campfire. Join us for minyan and bagels on Sunday morning while we chat about our week and ideas you have for the future of Temple Beth El. Bring your children to learn and play with other children at a ShaBaBimBam or Emmet's Playground. Sign your kids up for our teen program Mitzvah Makers, which will give them opportunities to connect with each other and the broader Stamford community. Pledge to our LIFE & LEGACY campaign-the community wide endowment campaign which will ensure that TBE will be here for our children. This is not trivial-our connection to both the past and the future depends on the support we give today. All it takes, for now, is a signed Intent to Give. If three more people sign up, TBE gets a \$5000 incentive bonus. So, no pressure, but if you would like to be part of this link to TBE's future, please let me, Carl Weinberg or Jeff Cohen know. A true generation to generation initiative.

Because Dor v'dor is the current that runs through it all; our children are watching and learning how to connect through tzedakah, prayer, ritual, and relationship.

I am certain that there are a thousand horrific reasons why someone would be damaged enough to commit the atrocity that happened in Texas, but I can't help but think that if that 18 year-old murderer had experienced connection like we offer here at Temple Beth El, if he felt anchored to a community like ours, maybe, maybe a tragedy like Uvalde could be avoided. Only connect.

Because in the end, this is us: Temple Beth El. We are a congregation whose whole and holy purpose is to be a spiritual home where we come to celebrate and strengthen our connection to our heritage, our spirituality, and most of all, to each other.

playful message that I needed to find a way to make the space for rest and recuperation at home. The famous line from "The Wizard of Oz" played loudly in my head, "There's no place like home," a divine message reminding us that the happiness we seek is often found in our own backyards.

So, I drove and I talked with friends. I sang along to my favorites and listened to some new music. The whole way I was smiling an unfamiliar but peaceful smile. I knew, with a sense that I seek at the heart of my seeking, that all was as it was meant to be.

But then, my self-critic arrived to analyze the experience: Why couldn't I feel this way whenever I wanted? Whenever I entered prayer? Where was this divine sense of purpose and rightness all the time? Why did it come and find me the very moment that I cleared my head and drove away without looking in the rearview mirror? Haven't I learned by now that all major things in my life show up when I least expect it? So here it was, my faith, ringing in my ears loudly and clearly. That day, I entered my car as a vehicle of transportation, but I exited it as a vehicle of transformation. I had no idea that it would be a drive to the middle of rural Pennsylvania that would bring me back home.

In 1962 the eleven-time Grammy winner gave seven concerts in six Israeli cities, handing over fees for the construction of the international youth center in Nazareth, which was named after the singer and should have become a symbol of Jewish-Arab co-existence.

Sinatra's tour of Israel came on Independence Day. "Old Blue Eyes" was at a ceremony next to Prime Minister Ben Gurion and Defense Minister Moshe Dayan.

In 1970 under the patronage of Sinatra, a million dollars was raised for the construction of the student center of the Hebrew University of Jerusalem and, in 1978, the center was named after the singer.

From there on to the length of days, Frank Sinatra became familiar with many well-known Jewish celebrities.

His contributions to well needed Jewish causes continued throughout his life.

May Frank Sinatra be remembered for his Jewish people as well as his beautiful singing.




