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# ON ONE FOOT

# A Huge Change for the High Holidays... ... That Most of You Won't Even Notice

In times of chaotic, unbridled change, religion simultaneously – and paradoxically - plays the dual roles of initiator and bulwark. It promotes transformation when



our values demand it but doesn't enact change without considerable deliberation. It sparks the combustion then gums up the works. This is especially true of the Conservative movement, which is by its very definition believes that tradition should never abandoned without good reason. For us, the wheels of transformation spin slowly.

But change happens, and a big one will take place during our High Holidays services that very few of you will notice, because it will occur at a time in the service when relatively few are at services – at the beginning of Mincha on Yom Kippur. Yet the change is significant.

Our Torah reading for Yom Kippur afternoon will now be the "alternate" reading, from Leviticus 19:1—18, rather than the traditional reading from the prior chapter, Leviticus 18. Both readings are found in our Lev Shalem Machzor and the alternate has been designated as a legitimate option for years, so the switch is hardly radical. In fact, given the stark differences between the old one and the new, one might justifiably ask why we took so long.

Although the two passages are found in consecutive chapters, their messages couldn't be more contrasting. The alternate reading contains some of the most central ethical teachings of Judaism, including "Love your neighbor as yourself." Meanwhile, the traditional reading focuses on forbidden sexual relationships. In ancient times, young Jews would meet-up following the temple ritual. So, a reminder of the dating "dos and don'ts" would have made sense in that setting.

But not in ours. While the alternate passage is all about love and acceptance, the traditional one emphasizes distinctions and boundaries. That traditional passage also contains some of the most problematic verses in the entire Torah, including the one ostensibly banning homosexuality. Sexual ethics have evolved considerably since biblical times, especially in regard to our understanding of the nature of LGBTQ relationships. Conservative Judaism has long since validated that shift, while at the same time affirming our need to continue to grapple with, rather than tossing aside, difficult traditional texts. But just because we never toss the Torah aside, that doesn't mean we need to feature some its most problematic passages in the passage selected for our holiest day.

Like the alternate reading, Yom Kippur is all about love and forgiveness, not exclusion and harshness. The whole focus of the liturgy is to call upon divine qualities of mercy, rather than harsh justice. If anything, justice is Rosh Hashanah's bailiwick, not Yom Kippur's.

I'm brought back to and early episode of "The West Wing," where a talk show host defends calling homosexuality

# Singing in Sacred Time

Summer means warm weather, poolside afternoons, and for many a "time out" of time. This "time out" can be intentional or it can be forced, but often it is a sensation in which our regular sense of linear time seems to have been suspended. We can invoke these times on



vacation, and they sometimes descend upon us during times of grief and loss. In whatever way we find ourselves in them, they offer a pause and beckon us to contemplate the pace of our daily lives or possibly, invite us to be mindfully in the present with no need or ability to be moving in a certain direction.

I've found myself contemplating time and alternate realities while watching season 4 of Stranger Things. In this Netflix series there is a portal of time in space into an alternate and evil dimension that is always present, and a group of teenagers is racing the clock each season to find and shut this portal to the alternate world. They work together, assisted by a girl with superpowers, to combat evil and protect life in this dimension. But how does this relate to singing in sacred time, you might ask?

The word portal holds the key. When we sing in Nusach, the melodic mode designated for each time of day, holiday, or Shabbat and we utilize mi sinai melodies, considered to have originated from Sinai or at least that far back in the Jewish psyche, we find and activate a portal in Jewish time and space. Every time we pray using the nusach of the service, we enter one of these portals of time and space. We can at one moment be swaying back and forth in the pews in Stamford, Connecticut and at the same time be surrounded by our ancestors in the desert. We can be praying in a minyan of ten Jews that instantly becomes tens of thousands across the globe, praying and swaying and humming and weaving in and out with the sacred melodies and patterns that say, "It is a weekday shacharit service," or "It is Friday evening ma'ariv now." The Barchu's and the Chatsi Kaddishes often help to lead the way and tell us where we are: Major, minor, Ukrainian Dorian, Ahava Raba (freygish), and Adonai Malakh name some of the major modes and they each offer us the chance to take a "time out of time," as we know it and to enter a sacred otherworldly dimension.

I invite you to join me in a three-part series on three consecutive Tuesday evenings (October 25, November 1, and November 8 at 7pm on ZOOM) as I teach about *Nusach* and sacred time. I will present examples and lead the group through different chants and melodic ways in which to remember which melodies are used for different parts of the services. We will begin the first session learning about weekday melodies, the second will focus on Shabbat, and the third will cover some major motives of High Holidays and Festivals. I'm so excited to share my love of these musical portals and channels with all of you, to listen to some examples of great chazzanut, and to increase the

# **GERRY GINSBURG, ASSOCIATE RABBI**

We are now in the month of Elul, a time for us to mentally prepare for the High Holydays. We need to reflect on the past year and understand where we can do a better job in the New Year. We do not have to completely remake ourselves. We need



to honestly look at ourselves and think about where we can do better.

There is an entire month, 29 days of Elul before Tishrei, and the start of the New Year. That's a lot of time to reflect on our relationships within our family, within our community and within the world. As the Chinese proverb says, "The journey of a thousand miles starts with the first step." That's all we have to do, make that first step, and then decide if more steps are needed.

A year goes by very quickly for some people, very slowly for others. But we need to take only a few moments each day, or at whatever time period works for you, to think about the areas we need to improve. The areas we can change.

Then, as we participate in services on the Yammim Noraim, the High Holydays, we can think of those areas when we recite our penitential prayers, such as the Al Chet. All areas are recited in the plural, as we, as a congregation or a people, have committed them all. But as we recite them, I believe we always pay special attention to the ones we know we have missed the mark on, to the ones we can certainly improve.

This doesn't have to be a self-directed journey. You can get help. There are many books which talk about the journey from Tisha B'Av to Yom Kippur. One such book is This Is Real and You Are Completely Unprepared: The Days of Awe as a Journey of Transformation, by Rabbi Alan Lew, z'l. It is a great companion for this time of the year. Rabbi Lew was a great believer in meditation, and the book contains meditations in addition to a guide to the calendar.

Teshuva, repentance, is done over time. It is the desire to repent, to change, that is important. That is the starting point. Without that realization there is no journey. That is the important first step. From there you begin your thousand-mile journey.

We usually don't begin any thought process without first remembering where we came from. We do it daily in the Amidah, our central prayer, which invokes the names of our patriarchs and matriarchs. We need to invoke the names of those who came before us, who started us out in life.

That is one reason we visit cemeteries in the month of Elul, to remember our parents and others who helped shape us. We pause at their gravesites and remember them for being a special force in our life. Many cemeteries, including Beth El Cemetery, offer a communal service to set the proper tone. (This year we will meet on Sunday, September 18 at 10:30 a.m. at the cemetery entrance.) But visitation is invited at any time of the month (excepting Shabbat and holidays). If one cannot visit the cemeteries, then look through

an "abomination" by saying that that is what the Bible says in Leviticus 18:22. This annoys President Bartlet, played by Martin Sheen, who proceeds to ask a few pointed questions about just what one should accept from the Bible.

He asks: "I'm interested in selling my youngest daughter into slavery as sanctioned in Exodus 21:7. She's a Georgetown sophomore, speaks fluent Italian, always cleaned the table when it was her turn. What would a good price for her be?"

"My chief of staff, Leo McGarry, insists on working on the Sabbath. Exodus 35:2 clearly says he should be put to death. Am I morally obligated to kill him myself or is it okay to call the police?"

"Here's one that's really important cause we've got a lot of sports fans in this town: Touching the skin of a dead pig makes one unclean. Leviticus 11:7 If they promise to wear gloves can the Washington Redskins still play football (back when they had that name!)? Can Notre Dame? Can West Point?"

"Does the whole town really have to be together to stone my brother, John, for planting different crops side by side? Can I burn my mother in a small family gathering for wearing garments made from two different threads?"

"Think about those questions, would you?"

Aaron Sorkin, who grew up Jewish in Scarsdale but never went to Hebrew School, is right to have his characters question those who take the entire Bible literally, without challenging some of its more difficult verses. For Jews, this is hardly new. The rabbinic sages did the same thing 2,000 years ago. As my professors used to remind me constantly: We are not biblical Jews. We are rabbinic Jews.

Which is part of why I didn't rush to replace the traditional reading when the alternate became available. Yes, it's problematic, but one of the lessons of the High Holidays is that being a Jew is something we should struggle with and not take at face value. We don't just toss the Torah aside if we don't like what it says.

The other (and main) reason we stuck to the traditional reading is that we have one reader who has been reading the second aliyah for over thirty years, since he was a teenager. Jed Sackin never missed his reading once. How could I take it from him? Some traditions are worth keeping. And as Jed's parents passed on and his sister Hope moved away, it seemed even more important to me that his family continue to be represented at our service. So, year after year, he did that problematic (and very long) reading.

So, what changed? Two things. One is that the other Mincha readings no longer have legacy readers (For years, certain teens have claimed certain High Holiday readings as "their own"). And second, Jed agreed to learn the alternate reading for the second aliyah and actually thought it was a good idea. So, Jed will still read this Yom Kippur – and we'll learn about how important it is to love our neighbor as ourselves.

There will be something new this Yom Kippur, a flavorsome blend of Sackin and Sorkin, the same reader, a new reading – and an eternal message of love and acceptance.

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

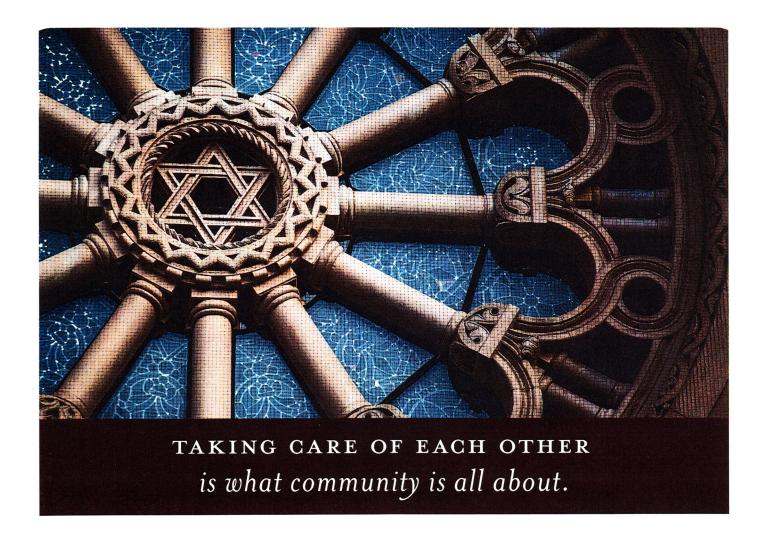
