ON ONE FOOT

The Last Word

This is my final Bulletin article as your senior rabbi. I'll continue to contribute to the Bulletin, so it's not goodbye. But still, it seems that a final message should be a little different. So I've collected a few key



passages from messages written over the years (You can see a number of my Bulletin messages at https://www.joshuahammerman.com/search/label/TBE%20Bulletins) that reflect some of the key points I've returned to often.

In an article from Feb., 2014, I welcomed the New York Limmud Conference to Stamford by describing our hometown as a haven of Jewish diversity and mutual respect. As we marked the passing of Senator Lieberman last month, we can only wonder whether the promise of a tolerant, unified community can still be realized in these increasingly polarized times. I wrote:

Only in Jewish Stamford could the Conservative rabbi meet the new Reform rabbi for the first time at an Orthodox shul — on Tisha b'Av! With veteran political aisle-crossers like Joe Lieberman and Dick Blumenthal having called Stamford home, we are among the nation's prime exporters of bipartisanship to the nation's capital.

In September, 1995, I wrote about how every nook and cranny of a synagogue should reflect our highest values. At that time, we had just dedicated an accessible bathroom, which has since also become our all-gender facility. Here's what I wrote:

In Judaism, bodily functions are sacred and worthy of blessings. What messages does our new, accessible bathroom convey?

- That all are welcome here. Everybody counts.
- That we reach out to embrace people who are different, because within each of us resides the image of God.
- That we hear the Torah's call to be especially kind to those who have suffered, for we were slaves in the land of Egypt.
- That we will spare no expense to do what is right and just. So, tell me: Is it just a bathroom then, or an expression of our deepest convictions? And how about our new tallit rack, set up exactly in between the men's and women's bathrooms? What message does this tell people about egalitarianism and the sanctity of the tallit? Yes, every inch of our building is "religious." And every inch of your home too.

In a 1995 bulletin article celebrating the Temple's 75th anniversary, I counted down my top five memories of my first seven-years at TBE. Here's what I included then:

September 11, 1987 I was officially welcomed as Beth El's first Assistant Rabbi at a special service before a large crowd. President Alan Kalter opened the proceedings by explaining why an assistant rabbi was necessary for Beth El (not yet called TBE) and why I was the one for the job. I don't know about anyone else, but he convinced me. Alan could be very persuasive. Then Rabbi Goldman spoke eloquently about the

Favorite melodies and recognizable songs from Broadway shows, Silver Screen, and the Jazz Club are sure to have you tapping your toes while invoking a nostalgic smile.

I will be joined by Cantor Micah Morgovsky from Temple Sinai along with Cantor Shimon Smith, the Music Director from Romemu in New York City, to sing songs, duets, and ensemble numbers together with fun and flair. Both of these singers are so enjoyable to work with and perform alongside, and I'm sure we will have such a fun time creating the magic of this concert that everyone will enjoy being under the spell that this music will cast.

Along with the singers, we will be joined on stage by a five-piece jazz ensemble featuring the following musicians: Chris Coogan (piano/vocal), Koby Hayon (guitar), Nadav Snir -Zelniker (percussion), Peter Slavov (bass), and Nir Naaman (trumpet) for Some Enchanted Evening of song. Songs from this period of time have resonated with me ever since I was a child and they set the backdrop for my pursuit of music and love of theater. Each song tells a story, and each story unlocks a bit of understanding of what it means to be human. These brilliant Jewish composers understood this better than most and brought out the full range of human emotion in their songs.

As part of the evening, we will be honoring Carl and Dana Weinberg for their immense contributions to Temple Beth El over the years. Together, their model of leading by example has helped us arrive in this moment as the Temple Beth El of the past, present, and future is being synthesized. I hope you will join us in celebrating their accomplishments and honoring them by placing an ad in the journal and honoring them with your presence at the concert.

I hope to see you here at Temple Beth El for the concert on Sunday June 9th at 7 pm!

Jewish value of welcoming newcomers, and I felt most welcome. Finally, Hazzan Rabinowitz dedicated a new musical composition in my honor, based on Isaiah and entitled, "The Lord is in Our Midst." At that point, I began to get a little concerned that expectations were getting a bit too high. But what a welcome it was.

December 24, 1987 Who would have thought that one of my top memories would be a Christmas Eve? But this one was so moving. The old homeless shelter was packed on this cold night. Inside there was only warmth. My job was to dole out the stuffing, and as the people passed, most of their heads were down, I wished each a Merry Christmas and shook their hands. Many lifted their eyes to say thank you, and I wasn't sure if it was for the food or the moment of humanity. I spoke of dignity to those assembled on that night, of love of neighbor and the spark of God in each human being. And then I led them in a round of Jingle Bells. It was moments like this that gave birth to Beth El Cares.

June 1990 With typical chutzpah, we tried what many considered untenable: A Talmud class. Weekly, intensive, and in the summer. The year of the Talmud, we called it, with a little flair for the dramatic., grabbing hold of the coattails of all the publicity gained by the publication of the Steinsaltz Talmud translation. We hoped for a response, but nothing, nothing prepared us for what was to happen. 52 people showed up on the first night, and after that, almost as many showed each week. And here we were, a group of 20th Century Americans, debating whether pressed figs, stalks of flax, and loose eggs found on the ground can be kept by the finder. As we penetrated the text, rabbis from centuries ago were welcomed into the discussion. This class galvanized our entire adult ed program.

September 19, 1992 A whirlwind month, including my memorable installation and the High Holidays. But perhaps the greatest thrill came from the unlikeliest source, a regular Shabbat morning. We staged our "Grand Opening," unveiling our new prayer book and user-friendly service guides, our three children's services and most of all our lunches. This was our first community lunch. And it was graciously sponsored by Eileen Rosner. We planned for 80 and hoped for 100. Twice that many showed up and before we knew it, the food was gone. Now we plan better and make more; the food's better too. We don't get 200 people every week like we did that day; But from that day on there was no turning back. Shabbat morning at Beth El, the complete package was here to stay.

June 28, 1994 What a way to spend my anniversary - on a 10 hour El Al flight, separated from Mara by two very well-behaved children in need of constant entertainment. But what a trip it was. The Beth El Israel tour came as close to perfection as any project I've ever undertaken. All the ingredients were there: our excellent tour coordinator, Pamela Allen; a superb guide and driver; a group of about 30 - the perfect size, varying in age, but consistent in how they cared for one another, like one big family. And Israel, at a time filled with excitement and hope. We even had coolish weather for a while. Then after our return, I received what might have been

my favorite backhanded compliment ever, as more than one participant said., "We didn't think it could be so much fun going with a rabbi." I guess I never imagined it would be so much fun to lead a group to Israel with two lovely but very young children. On my anniversary.

Here's a bulletin article **from May 2004**, describing the holy work that we do in synagogue life:

ON ONE FOOT

The Job We Are Here to Do

As we roll into May, we begin to evaluate the year gone by and look ahead to what we can do over the coming months. It is a time for synagogues to take stock and replenish themselves organizationally, just as we do individually on the High Holy Days.



Rabbi Harold Kushner once wrote about responding to the typical cynic who says to him, "I tried to get involved in your synagogue but found it to be full of petty, small minded hypocrites." He would resist the temptation to say, "There's always room for one more." and instead would respond, "A synagogue that admitted only saints would be like a hospital that admitted only healthy people. It would be a lot easier to run, and a more pleasant place to be, but I'm not sure we would be doing the job we are here to do."

Rabbi Kushner's point is important to remember as we think about those who do the work that we are here to do, so tirelessly, so patiently, so lovingly. Some do it for a salary, others as volunteers, but there is no one here who doesn't do it for the love of the work itself. And, although the appreciation is never up to level that it could be, the rewards are great. The work itself is the reward. And the presence of a few who may be small-minded, slightly insensitive or simply having a bad day – that only enhances the satisfaction. When the chronic smilers leave smiling, that's no great accomplishment; but when we've gotten the perpetual complainers to smile, now THAT'S something to hang you hat on.

Here's an excerpt from the final message written by Hazzan Rabinowitz z'l, before he became emeritus in 2002. If you translate from Hazzan-ese to Hammerman-ese, he expresses many of the sentiments I wish to share with you now:

THE HAZZAN'S VOICE

ith this column, thirty-two years of monthly it messages of Kol Hahazzan come to a conclusion. Periodically, I will submit an article for publication, but it will find a place further into the bulletin. This spot, as you open your monthly bulletin, I relinquish to my successor, who, I presume, will continue the tradition of keeping you abreast of what is of interest in the world of hazzanuth.

After all the opportunities I have had to address you at services and at functions, it is difficult not to become repetitive. Some things do need to be restated. As I assume the position of Hazzan Emeritus, it is incumbent upon me to vacate the pulpit in favor of your new Hazzan, Deborah Jacobson. However, as we have shared three decades of life-cycle events and have established binding relationships, Sandy and I have no desire to absolve those relationships. I do want to keep in touch, and, if you so desire, to be another participant as you mourn or celebrate. My new little office will, when I am available, have the same open-door policy as was practiced in past years. I will be as close as your phone at all times no matter where we may reside.

My step to emeritus status is not to be considered as retirement. My days will be as full as ever, only now, on my own schedule. So, as I conclude this communication with you, I cannot conclude it with a "good-bye." A simple L'hitraot, until we see each other again, will suffice.

As we proclaim with the conclusion of a Book of the Torah, Chazak Chazak, V'nitchazeik – let us be strong – physically, emotionally, spiritually, in our determination for all Israel, and let us strengthen each other.

AND NOW, IN CONCLUSION....

While this is not goodbye, after over 40 years in the pulpit rabbinate, it is time to find new ways to make a difference. For the first time in four decades, I'll be liberated from the 24/7 pressures of pulpit life. As I said in my Yom Kippur sermon, I've never gotten caught up in the game of needing to live up to others' expectations. But it's my own expectations that are the crux of the matter. Those expectations are always skyhigh. I wake up literally every morning knowing that somewhere, with someone, I could be doing better.

Now I'll wake up and just say, "Pass the coffee." That will be a great relief.

And for the first time in over 40 years, I will not need to do the rabbinic version of "teaching to the test," whenever I lecture or write. I've never been shy about expressing my opinion (God knows) but I've always done that knowing that I would have to answer to the usual critiques, many of them At times I looked at the finished product and wondered whether it reflected more of what I needed to say or what you needed – and wanted – to hear. Rabbis do that all the time. It's part of the inherent tension when your students are also your bosses. And it's not healthy, because true spiritual leaders cannot simply be preaching what they think the people want to hear. As Heschel wrote of the biblical prophet, "He is neither a singing saint nor a moralizing poet. His images must not shine, they must burn." You can't deliver a message that burns if you are giving them what you think will earn a high-five. (See my list of Top Ten Taboo Sermons, from 2003). I've done better than most at preserving my integrity while pleasing most of my bosses, but I'm so glad to be jumping off that merry-go-round, no longer having to teach to the test.

I wrote about my many bosses in June 1995: Back then, the boss I was most concerned about was, in fact, myself: ... Not myself now, but myself 25 years from now, the one who will be looking back at a full career. I want to be able to say

that I made a difference, that I did all I could to seek my destiny and fulfill it.

Nikos Kazantzakis posited that if we are each a bow in God's hands, then there are three kinds of prayers uttered by three kinds of souls. The first says, "Draw me, Lord, lest I rot"; the second, "Do not overdraw me, Lord, I shall break"; and the third says, "Overdraw me, Lord, and who cares if I break." If I may combine metaphors, a quarter-century from now I want God to have spent all the arrows in the quiver marked "Hammerman."

For when all is said and done, I will have to answer to no boss. But I will have to account for all those unused arrows -- and for the bow that refused to be overdrawn.

So now I look back – and look ahead – and realize that there are several arrows still to be fired. It is up to me, and no one else, to make sure that they are. For that to happen, there'll have to be a lot less "teaching to the test" and a lot more plumbing the depths of my soul to see what messages I need to share. Some of my praying will be with my mouth, some with my pen and some with my feet. In an existential election year here, and with Israel tottering at the edge, what can I do? (I was considering going to Georgia to hand out water at sweltering polling stations, but that didn't work out so well for Larry David.) Opportunities will present themselves, and I'll be open to them.

It's time to draw that bow.


Noah's Ark

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




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
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
