



"The Synagogue as Docking Station"

Dear friends,

As we prepare for the High Holidays, Cantor Kaplan and I have spent some time reflecting on the purpose of coming to shul. To borrow a phrase from my



teacher, Rabbi Irwin Kula, what is the "job" we "hire" the synagogue, and particularly services, to "get done" for us?

As we discussed this question, we kept finding ourselves comparing the synagogue to a docking station — a metaphor that, while I'm no sailor, felt fitting. Of course, and especially for us here on the "Gold Coast" of Connecticut, the term "docking station," might evoke images of a placid harbor, a place for boats to safely rest when not in use. And it's true that, throughout history, many people have indeed seen the synagogue as a place of refuge from our weary world. In our present era of upheaval, I imagine many of us resonate with the idea that the purpose of attending synagogue is to seek sanctuary.

Yet in the course of our conversation, we repeatedly returned to another kind of docking station, namely, the humble, yet crucial, place where we charge our cell phones and other devices. It's something small, often overlooked, but essential — and frustrating when we can't find it!

What if we looked at our synagogue as that kind of docking station? What if the synagogue were a place where we draw energy and recharge our spiritual and moral batteries? How would that change how we approach synagogue services as worshippers? How would that change the way I approach synagogue services as a rabbi?

When I visited Temple Beth El for my interview weekend last January, I shared that this is the way I think about the synagogue generally, and services specifically. I see the purpose of gathering in the sanctuary not as a retreat from the world. Rather, it is to prepare ourselves, to purify our hearts, to equip and energize ourselves, for the service of repairing the world outside.

That's why I find it so beautiful, so powerful, that Temple Beth El has always been "a synagogue with windows, and not walls." Our sanctuary is specifically designed to remind us that we come here not to escape our broken world but, rather, to prepare to repair it.

Many of us doubtlessly look to the synagogue to be this kind of docking station at this time of year, during the High Holidays. But just as we don't charge our phones only once a year, our spiritual batteries need consistent recharging. In a world that often feels rootless, our synagogue is a rooted place — a source of connection in a time of endemic loneliness, a space where we can find ourselves, each other, and that which is bigger than us all.

How might our lives improve if we made synagogue attendance more a part of our daily, or at least weekly, routines? How might we be better positioned to improve

The cyclical nature of the way we mark time has always served as a source of comfort and homecoming for me. In the setting of the Kaddish that I composed last year along with Ben Pagliaro we included the phrase, "Everything ends and begins again, and through it all we praise." This is at the heart of what it means to live in Jewish time and to make meaning by sanctifying a moment with intention and words of prayer. It is a powerful reminder that nothing lasts forever and yet the very nature of our journey is to embrace gratitude and celebrate the constant turning force of our existence.

Along with composing music, I've been writing a lot of poetry recently and would like to offer you a prayer that I wrote for New Beginnings. May it reach you wherever you are as a gentle invitation to take that first step in the direction of your truth.

A Prayer for New Beginnings

Oh, Divine Source of Potential, of Creation, of All that Is, bless this first step, that it may unfold into subsequent steps, guiding us closer to you, to fulfilling our souls at this time and place. Strengthen us when we are unsure, provide signs when we are lost, and help us to realize we are not journeying alone. Guide our steps. Protect our hearts. Help us to look up and smile with gratitude for and awareness of all that is and all that may be unfolding at this moment now and for eternity.

our community, and indeed our world, if we recharged our spiritual and moral batteries more often than once a year?

I recognize that many of us have mixed feelings about prayer. But talking to God is only one way synagogue attendance energizes. Your charge might come from talking to the people who are talking to God, or even just from enjoying kiddush with your community. There's no one right reason, and no one right way. So, whether you come to pray, to schmooze with your neighbor, or just to enjoy a good lunch, it's all good! They're your batteries, and only you know what you need to charge them. So come as you are, for as long as you want or need, as often as you can. No judgment. Really. I'll just be happy to help you recharge, and to charge my own batteries alongside you in the same docking station.

So, as we enter this sacred season, I invite you to think not just of the High Holy Days, but beyond them. Let's come to see our synagogue as a docking station – more beneficial the more often we return. Perhaps we can start with Shabbat, which happens each and every week, all year long.

May the year ahead be one of increasing connection and growing relationships, with many meaningful and energizing returns to our docking station.

WE WELCOME YOU TO JOIN US ON SHABBAT MORNINGS

We warmly welcome you to show up for services on Shabbat in whatever way is meaningful to you. A reminder: you don't have to attend services to come for lunch on Shabbat! Services begin at 10 am, and we get to lunch around 12:15 pm. You can also show up for and/or leave services any time:

- From 10 until about 10:30 am, we sing the joyous and soulful melodies of P'sukei D'zimrah, the preliminary service.
- From about 10:30 to 10:45 am is the morning service, Shaharit (including greatest hits like Shema and the Amidah).
- We take the Torah out at about 10:45 am, and chant from the Torah and Haftarah portions until about 11:30 am.
- The D'var Torah (sermon) takes place around 11:30 am.

Between 11:45 am-12:15 pm, we conclude the service with Musaf, Aleinu, and Adon Olam (we always invite children up to help lead some of these final prayers, and any kid who helps lead gets to pick a prize from the Rabbi's "Tchotchke Chest"!).

And for those who wish to partake, you are welcome to make a "L'chaim!" with us on a beverage of your choosing (whether alcoholic or non-alcoholic) after services. I can personally guarantee good bourbon, an awesome and creative signature cocktail based on the weekly Torah portion, and even better schmoozing!

From Great to Good

During this High Holiday season – and beyond – it is good to focus on how we can go from Great to Good, Jewishly, echoing Alexis De Tocqueville's iconic reflection, "America is great because she is good."



Here's the full quote:

I sought for the greatness and genius of America in her commodious harbors and her ample rivers, and it was not there. I sought for the greatness and genius of America in her fertile fields and boundless forests, and it was not there. I sought for the greatness and genius of America in her rich mines and her vast world commerce, and it was not there. I sought for the greatness and genius of America in her public school system and her institutions of learning, and it was not there. I sought for the greatness and genius of America in her democratic Congress and her matchless Constitution, and it was not there. Not until I went into the churches of America and heard her pulpits flame with righteousness did I understand the secret of her genius and power. America is great because she is good, and if America ever ceases to be good, she will cease to be great.

What an amazing quote. Here's the rub. De Tocqueville never said it, at least it can't be found in any of his writings. As exposed in Snopes.com - https://www.snopes.com/fact-check/america-is-great-de-tocqueville/ - the passage seems to have evolved independently, and we have no idea where it originated.

This should trouble us, at a time where so much information we receive is "fake news" – especially in an election year. There is no question that malevolent forces are trying to manipulate truths.

On the other hand, from time immemorial, words have been ascribed to authors who could not possibly have written them. We see that with many passages in the Bible, including many psalms and entire books like Ecclesiastes and Song of Songs – and the Torah itself. The Zohar was ascribed to Rabbi Shimon Bar Yochai, who lived 12 centuries earlier. But the arguments over authorship should never diminish the power of the words themselves. All too often we get hung up over peripheral matters like authorship and fail to appreciate the deeper meanings embedded within.

This year, when I pray on the High Holidays, for the first time in half a century, I won't be working. That was a choice I made. In truth, I turned down the chance to lead services on a European cruise. Too soon for that. No, this year I wanted to be back in the pews. So, for part of the High Holidays, I've been invited back to my home shul in Brookline, the very place where I first led services on the Days of Awe and where my father led them for 30 years. Just a couple of months before his death, my father, who was recovering from a heart attack, sat in those same pews for the first time in three decades, and I sat with him. That

CRITICAL VOLUNTEERS NEEDED FOR BUILDING ONE COMMUNITY (B1C) IN STAMFORD

B1C has a terrific tutoring program for elementary students but doesn't have enough tutors. 14 volunteers (adults or teenagers) are needed on Monday - Thursday from 4:30pm-5:45pm. 


